## Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's) United Nations



The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are seventeen global objectives established by the United Nations to make the world a better, fairer and more sustainable place by 2030. They serve as an international framework for addressing major challenges such as poverty, health, education, inequality and access to clean water.

The work of Kolewa Foundation closely aligns with these goals. Through our daily activities in Indonesia, we make a concrete and visible contribution to several SDGs, with a strong focus on health care, well-being and strengthening vulnerable communities.

### **Quality health care and strengthening communities**

The social structure in Indonesia differs significantly from that in the Netherlands. While the emphasis in the Netherlands is often on the individual, community plays a central role in Indonesia. A child who does not receive adequate medical care not only faces personal limitations but also places a lasting burden on the family and the surrounding community. When a child is able to eat, speak, hear or move better as a result of medical treatment, the outlook for the entire family changes. Parents are better able to work, siblings can attend school and the pressure on the community is reduced. By helping one child, we often strengthen the lives of dozens of people around them. Because the children we support almost always come from the most impoverished families, Kolewa provides additional assistance where necessary to help create a healthy living environment. In this way, we contribute to SDG 3: Good Health and Well-being and SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities.

### **Identifying children in need of medical care**

A key component of our work is reaching children who require medical assistance but who would otherwise never come to the attention of health services. With our Medicar, the Kolewa team travels to poor and remote areas of Bali, where residents are often unable to visit a doctor or hospital on their own. Through local posters and community outreach, we inform families about the possibility of free surgery for children born with a cleft lip and/or palate. Midwives play a crucial role in this process, as they are often the first to identify congenital conditions at birth. During meetings—frequently organised in collaboration with local Puskesmas (community health centres)—the Kolewa team informs midwives about our work and referral options.

The children who are identified through this outreach are born with a cleft lip and/or palate, a hearing impairment, anorectal malformation (anal atresia), spina bifida, or have suffered severe burn injuries. Our Medica is equipped with basic supplies such as bandaging materials, infant formula, feeding teats, clothing and vitamins, enabling immediate first aid to be provided when necessary. In addition, the Outreach Car and our Suzuki minibus are used to safely transport children to hospitals in Denpasar. Through these activities, we contribute to SDG 3: Good Health and Well-being.



## Health care for children from remote Indonesian islands

Indonesia is home to many remote and impoverished islands, including Timor, Rote, Flores, Sumba and the Maluku Islands. On these islands, access to medical care is limited, and specialised treatments and surgical procedures are often unavailable. Kolewa Foundation therefore supports children and their caregivers from these regions by accompanying them to Bali, where they can access specialised hospitals and medical services. The Kolewa team provides support throughout the entire process, including travel and accommodation, medical appointments, aftercare and guidance at Rumah Bicara. In this way, we ensure that children from even the most isolated areas gain access to quality health care. Through this work, we contribute to SDG 3: Good Health and Well-being.

## Clean water and a healthy living environment

For a large part of the Indonesian population, access to clean drinking water is not a given. Many families do not have a connection to piped water and depend on river water or rainwater. Bottled water is unaffordable for them. Drinking heavily contaminated water causes serious health problems, especially among children.

Kolewa provides a simple and affordable solution through water filter sets. These consist of two buckets and a Tulip filter, enabling families to produce safe drinking water themselves. By using these filters, we improve the health and living conditions of entire households. Through this initiative, we contribute to SDG 6: Clean Water and Sanitation.



## Infant nutrition, food packages and essential supplies

In addition to medical care, Kolewa supports the most vulnerable families in meeting their basic needs. Children born with a cleft lip and/or palate must reach a minimum body weight before surgery can be safely performed. In practice, this weight is not always achieved due to malnutrition.

Kolewa provides these children with infant formula and nutritional supplements to help them gain sufficient strength. In addition, several times a year we distribute food packages to families living in extreme poverty. These packages contain essential staples such as rice, noodles, cooking oil, flour and other basic food items. Through this support, we contribute to SDG 2: Zero Hunger.

## Health insurance and financial accessibility

In Indonesia, a national health insurance scheme for low-income families exists, known as BPJS. While this system provides an important foundation, in practice it does not offer sufficient coverage for the medical conditions addressed by Kolewa. Treatment for cleft lip and/or palate is often not covered, and reimbursement for other conditions is frequently limited.

Kolewa Foundation supplements these gaps where necessary, ensuring that essential treatments can still take place. At the same time, we encourage and support families in registering for BPJS, so that they can maintain access to basic health care in the longer term. Through these efforts, we contribute to SDG 3: Good Health and Well-being.

# Kolewa collaboration & partnership



In 2025, our **CLP project** in Denpasar was made possible through strong and committed local collaboration. Together with three hospitals in Denpasar, Rotary Club Bali Nusa Dua, two dental clinics, and Asmah Vifa Vida Travel Agency, we were able to guide children and their families through complex medical and logistical journeys with care and continuity. The hospitals provided essential medical expertise, diagnostics, and surgical care, while the dental clinics played a crucial role in follow-up treatments and oral health support. Rotary Club Bali Nusa Dua once again proved to be a deeply involved partner, not only through financial support but also through personal engagement, events, and advocacy for our children. Vifa Travel Agency supported our work behind the scenes by assisting with travel arrangements, helping families reach Denpasar safely and on time—often a decisive factor for successful treatment.

Treatment for children with severe burns or anorectal malformations (anus atresia) was in safe and experienced hands with the dedicated medical specialists at Ngoerah Hospital, who provided high-quality care and guidance throughout the treatment process. For aftercare, such as physiotherapy, mobility support, and the provision of special orthopedic shoes, we continued our valued partnerships with Puspadi and YPK.

Last but not least, in 2025 we once again greatly valued our partnerships focused on deaf and hard-of-hearing children. Together with Lumina Hearing Center and the Susrusa Special Education School, we continued to work on early diagnosis, hearing support, and access to appropriate education. Through this collaboration, children were given the opportunity to communicate, learn, and participate more fully in society—an essential step toward a more inclusive future.

# Rumah Bicara, activity-center and shelterhome

At Rumah Bicara, our shelter home, we host children who require medical treatment in Denpasar and their parents or guardians who accompany them. Many of these families come from remote or underserved regions of Indonesia, where access to specialised health care is limited or unavailable.

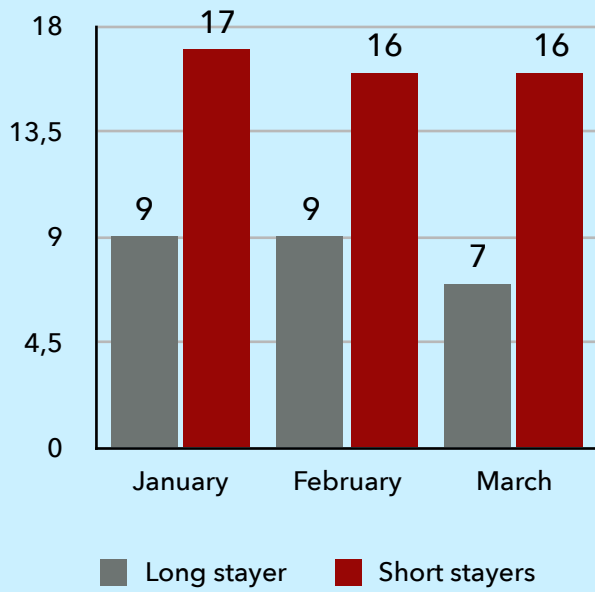
During their stay, Rumah Bicara offers a safe and welcoming place where families can rest, recover and prepare for hospital appointments. The shelter provides not only accommodation, but also daily meals, guidance and emotional support. By staying together, children and their caregivers are able to face medical treatments in a familiar and supportive environment.

Rumah Bicara is more than a place to stay. It is a temporary home where families find care, understanding and reassurance during a challenging period in their lives.

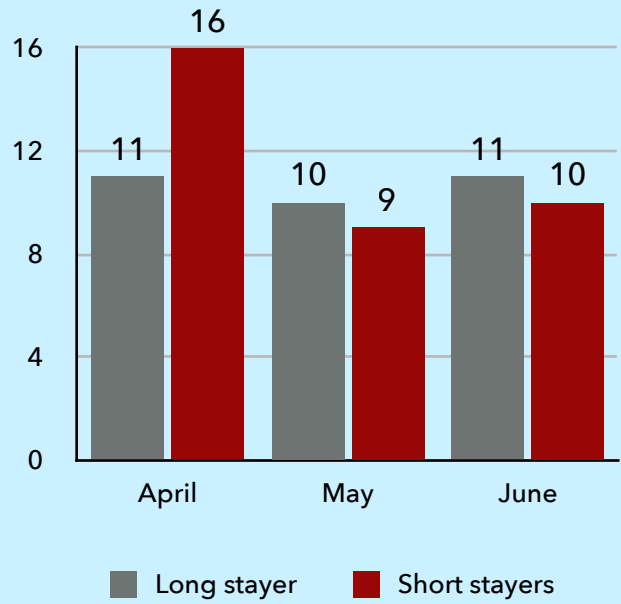




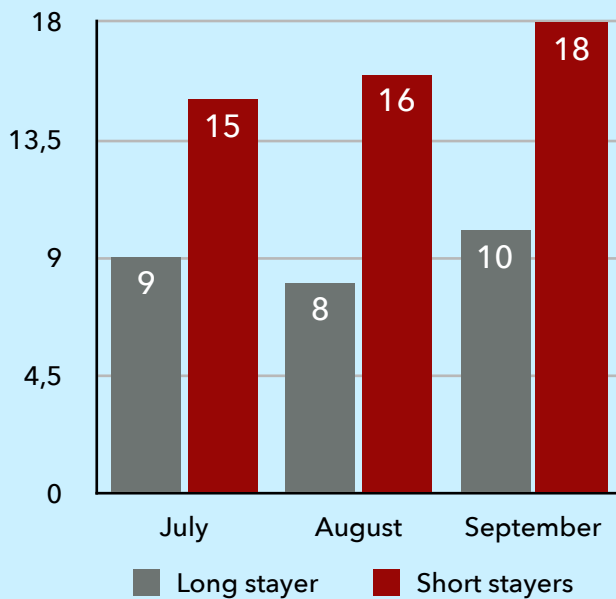
Numbers of patients and guardians hosted in Rumah Bicara and Kolewa Gang period January - March 2025:



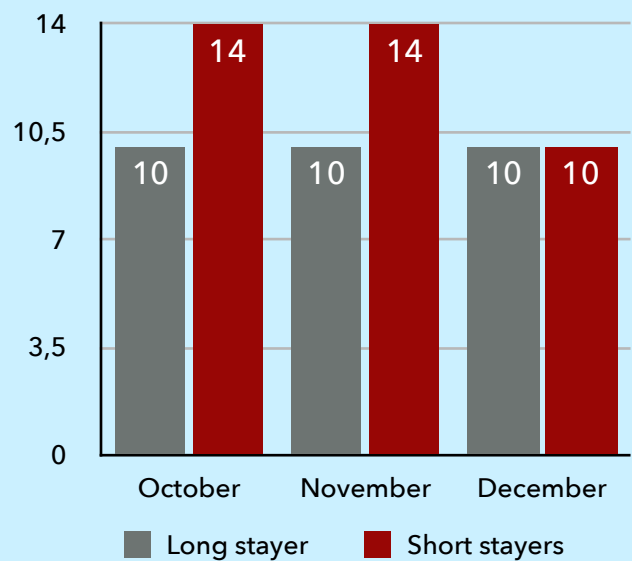
Numbers of patients and guardians hosted in Rumah Bicara and Kolewa Gang period April - June 2025:



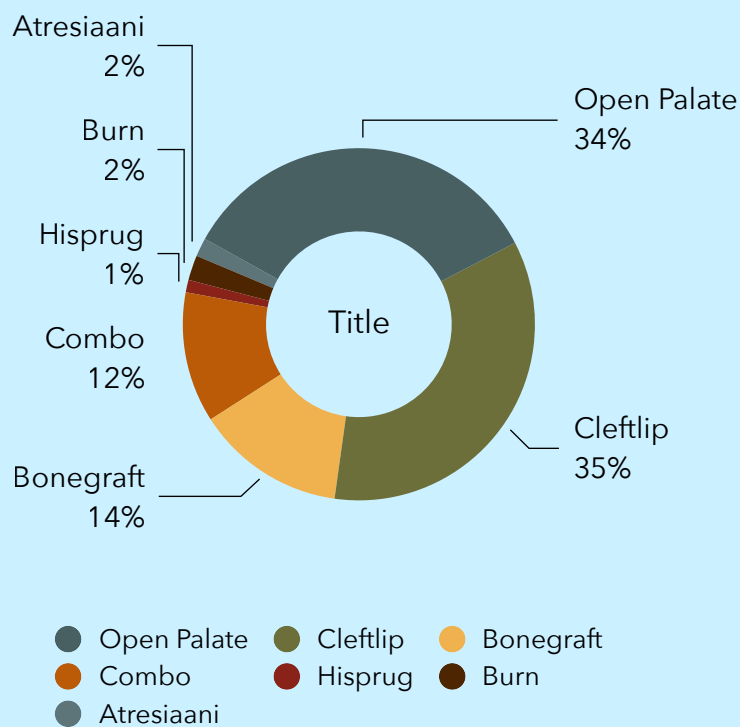
Numbers of patients and guardians hosted in Rumah Bicara and Kolewa Gang period July - September 2025:

# Percentage Patients 2025



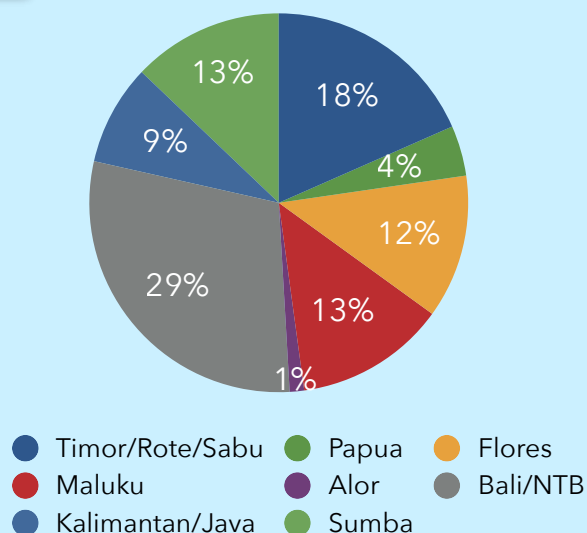
Throughout 2025, we successfully supported a total of 167 short stayers patients requiring surgical treatment, including cases of cleft lip, open palate, bone graft, and combined procedures. Among these, cleft lip surgeries accounted for the highest number of operations.

The majority of these patients were new cases, while the remaining patients required follow-up or additional surgeries, either as part of our previously provided free surgery programs or, in a smaller number of cases, patients who had previously received treatment through other organizations and later placed their trust in Kolewa to continue their medical care journey.

For long stayer patients, we generally provided accommodation and support for 4 to 7 months. However, in certain cases, patients were hosted for more than one year, depending on the severity of their condition and the presence of additional medical complications.



We have expanded our reach to support a greater number of children and adults in accessing free surgical treatment. Outreach efforts carried out by our staff and local scouts have yielded positive results, enabling us to cover a wider geographic area. Based on our summary, the percentage distribution of patients across each region can be seen in the following presentation.



# Daily activities



Every day at Rumah Bicara begins quietly, with the sounds of morning routines and shared anticipation. For the children staying at the house—together with their parents or guardians—this is a place of safety and care during an often intense medical journey.

Meals are an important part of each day. Our kitchen team prepares healthy, nutritious food tailored to the needs of recovering children, helping them regain strength before and after hospital visits. For many families, this regular access to balanced meals offers both physical nourishment and peace of mind.

Personal care and attention are woven naturally into daily life at Rumah Bicara. Staff and volunteers support families with practical matters, accompany them to hospital appointments and ensure that children feel seen and comforted. Small routines—help with bathing, dressing or simply sitting together—make a big difference when medical treatments are demanding.

Equally important are moments of relaxation and play. Through drawing, games, music and simple creative activities, children are given space to be children again. These moments help ease stress, distract from hospital experiences and bring laughter back into the day. For parents and guardians, it offers a brief moment of rest and connection with others who understand their journey.

Going to the park or the beach is not part of the daily routine, but whenever circumstances allow, we try to create opportunities to be outdoors. Simple picnics outside are organised as often as possible, offering fresh air, movement and a change of scenery. On special occasions—such as Independence Day, Easter and other meaningful moments—these outings become celebrations, creating joyful memories that stand in contrast to the challenges of medical treatment.



At Rumah Bicara, healing is not only about medical care. It is about warmth, structure and human connection—creating an environment where children and their families can recover with dignity, hope and confidence as they move step by step toward a healthier future.



# Kolewa outbuilding & central kitchen



In addition to our headquarters, Kolewa operates a second location next to our main building, where patients and their parents or guardians are accommodated. This outbuilding offers a safe and welcoming space where families can come together, enjoy nutritious meals and find rest after hospital visits. Thanks to the dedication of our housekeeping team and the care of our chef in the central kitchen, this location has grown into a warm and supportive environment. For many families, it truly becomes a temporary second home—one where they feel part of the Kolewa family during a challenging period in their lives.



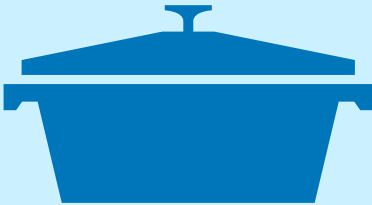
# cooking-class

After a few inspiring hours, the group gathered around the table to enjoy a delicious lunch together with the Kolewa team – a moment of sharing, connection, and pride in what had been created. The recipes and photos were later sent by email, but the memories of that day will last far longer. For many, it was an experience that will never be forgotten.





## Growing Support and Recognition in Bali

In 2025, we felt deeply proud and grateful for the growing attention and support Yayasan Kolewa Harapan Indonesia received from within Bali itself. Companies, churches and community groups reached out to us in increasing numbers, offering their time, resources and encouragement. Their involvement showed us that our work is not only seen, but truly valued.

We were especially touched that several schools found their way to Kolewa. By visiting our foundation, teachers and students learned that life can be very different when a child is born with a deformity or medical condition. These encounters created moments of understanding, empathy and awareness—planting seeds of compassion in the next generation.

Throughout the year, visitors brought joy into our shelter home. They came with entertainment, warm attention, presents for the children, groceries for the kitchen and envelopes containing donations. Each visit, whether big or small, made a meaningful difference and strengthened the sense of community around Kolewa.

Looking back on 2025, we clearly noticed that the Kolewa Foundation is becoming more widely known, respected and loved. This growing recognition in Bali gives us confidence and energy to continue our mission—together, supported by a community that truly cares.

# Kolewa scouting and outreach in Indonesia

Kolewa actively scouts for children in need of medical care across a wide range of Indonesian islands. As shown on the map, our outreach focuses strongly on eastern Indonesia, where access to healthcare is limited and distances are great.

In 2025, most patients came from Bali and Nusa Tenggara Barat (NTB), followed by Timor, Rote and Sabu, Sumba, Flores, and Maluku. We also reached children from Papua, Kalimantan/Java, and Alor.

Through close collaboration with village leaders, and former patient families, we are able to identify children who would otherwise remain unseen

Our local scouts are valued members of the Kolewa team and play a crucial role in reaching children and families in remote areas. They visit families in their villages, assess medical needs, and help parents navigate complex paperwork and referrals. With patience and care, they guide families step by step through the process – from the first contact to arranging travel. In many cases, they accompany children and their guardians all the way to the airport, and sometimes even personally escort them to our shelterhome in Bali.

# food-support

Alongside medical care, social support has always been an essential part of Kolewa's work. In 2025, we continued to stand beside the most vulnerable families in and around Denpasar, as well as former patients living on other Indonesian islands, where poverty often remains a daily reality.

In Denpasar, we focused on people living and working at the very margins of society. For those who earn their living by collecting recyclable waste, we provided a weekly free meal throughout the year. These moments were about more than food alone—they offered dignity, connection, and a brief pause from a harsh daily routine.



Our support also reached families with newborn babies born with a cleft lip or palate. Before surgery can safely take place in Denpasar, these babies must reach a minimum healthy weight—something that is far from guaranteed in families struggling with food insecurity. By providing nutritious baby formula and supplements, we helped ensure that these infants could grow strong enough for their first, life-changing operation.

In addition, we regularly delivered food packs to families living in extreme poverty, including former Kolewa patients on remote islands who continue to need support long after their medical treatment has ended. Each package contained basic food items that help families get through difficult weeks and ease the constant worry about their next meal.

Through these social activities, Kolewa aims to look beyond medical treatment alone. By supporting nutrition, basic needs, and daily survival, we help create the conditions in which healing, recovery, and hope can truly take root.

# waterfilters



## Clean Water Changes Everything

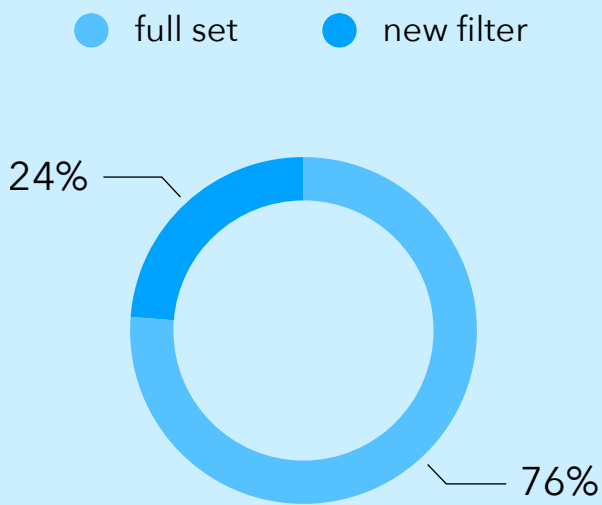
Access to clean drinking water is still far from guaranteed for many families in Indonesia. In rural and coastal areas, people often rely on river water, rainwater or shallow wells that are unsafe to drink. Bottled water is too expensive for daily use, and boiling water requires gas or firewood—resources that cost money and are not always available.

This is why Kolewa distributes water filter sets. A simple filter can make a huge difference: families gain immediate access to safe drinking water without having to boil it. This not only improves health, especially for children, but also saves money. Families no longer need to buy gas or collect firewood, reducing both household expenses and environmental pressure.

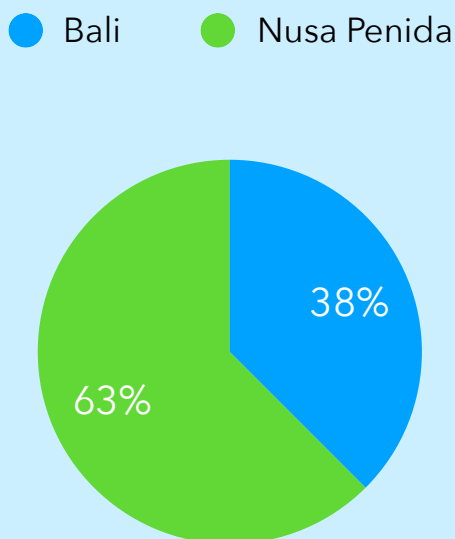


Our way of working is personal and community-based. We distribute water filters during home visits, where families receive clear instructions on use and maintenance. In addition, we organize group distributions in local banjar (village meeting places), where several households come together at the same time. These moments are also used to share knowledge about hygiene and safe water practices. The selection of families is done carefully and always in close collaboration with local partners. Our local scouts, village heads and community leaders help identify households most in need. We also receive valuable information from former Kolewa patients and their families, who know exactly where support is urgently required.

In 2025, we distributed 61 water filter sets and replaced 19 worn-out filters at family homes that had received their first filter about two years earlier. These activities took place in Bali and Nusa Penida. By renewing existing filters, we ensure that families continue to have long-term access to clean and safe drinking water.



Some of our sponsors from abroad choose to join us during their holiday in Bali to help distribute water filter sets in person. Together with the Kolewa team, they hand over the filters directly to families at home or in the village. These moments are always special – filled with compassion, gratitude and shared happiness – and make the impact of clean drinking water tangible for everyone involved.



# Offering a helping hand to the **BLOODBANK**

A reliable blood supply is vital for healthcare in Bali, yet shortages occur frequently. Hospitals depend on donated blood for emergency surgeries, childbirth complications, accident victims and children undergoing intensive medical treatments. When stocks run low, this puts enormous pressure on patients and hospitals alike. For this reason, encouraging regular blood donation is essential.

In 2025, Yayasan Kolewa Harapan Indonesia actively supported blood drives in various areas of Denpasar, helping the local blood bank reach more donors and raise awareness about the importance of giving blood consistently. During these on-location blood donation events, Kolewa provided healthy meals for donors. This support proved valuable in several ways. Donating blood can cause temporary side effects such as dizziness or fatigue; a nutritious meal helps replenish energy levels, stabilize blood sugar and supports a quicker recovery. Just as importantly, offering food is a tangible way to show appreciation for donors' time and generosity, creating a warm, positive and caring atmosphere around the donation process. By supporting these blood drives, Kolewa not only helped the blood bank logistically, but also contributed to a culture of solidarity and care. Together, we encourage more people to donate blood regularly—because every donation can save lives, often when it matters most.





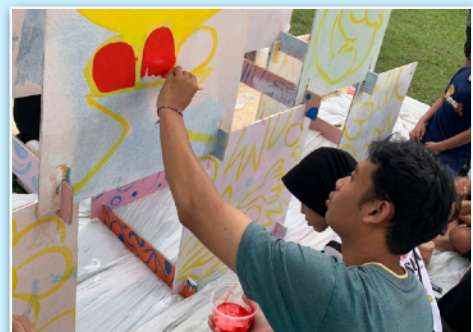
In 2025, Kolewa opened again their doors for a group of 75 deaf and hard-of-hearing children on Bali—children who too often grew up in isolation, with limited opportunities to communicate, make friends or fully participate in society. By joining our program, these children were able to step out of their small, quiet worlds and discover the power of connection through sign language.

Communication lies at the heart of inclusion. All members of the Kolewa team are officially trained in sign language and are fully capable of “speaking with their hands.” This shared language created a safe and welcoming environment in which children could express themselves freely, be understood, and truly belong. For many, it was the first time they could communicate effortlessly with adults and peers outside their own family.

Every weekend, our focus was on this group of children in Denpasar and Karangasem. Through group activities, play, learning moments and shared experiences, friendships are still growing. Laughter replaced silence, and confidence visibly increased as children realised they were no longer alone.

In addition to the weekend program, 21 of these children participated during the week in Kolewa’s school project, where they received structured education in an environment fully adapted to their needs. Here, sign language is not an exception, but the norm—giving children the tools they need to learn, develop and look toward the future with confidence.

By offering access to communication, education and friendship, Kolewa helps deaf and hard-of-hearing children break free from isolation. Together, we are building a community in which silence no longer limits opportunity—and every child is seen, heard and valued.



## Hearingtest, hearing-aid & maintenance



### **Collaboration with Lumina Hearing Centre: A key partner in our work for deaf and hard-of-hearing children in 2025**

In close collaboration with their professional team, children referred by Kolewa receive thorough hearing tests to assess their level of hearing loss. For those who can benefit, hearing aids are carefully selected and individually adjusted to each child's needs. This precise fitting is essential to ensure the best possible outcome and to support the child's ability to communicate, learn, and connect with others. Through this partnership, we are able to give children not only access to technology, but also to new opportunities and a stronger voice in daily life. Thanks to Kolewa friends from the Netherlands, we received many high-quality hearing devices—especially suitable for children—which greatly support this program and help us keep costs manageable. Through this combined effort, we are able to offer effective and sustainable hearing support to more children.

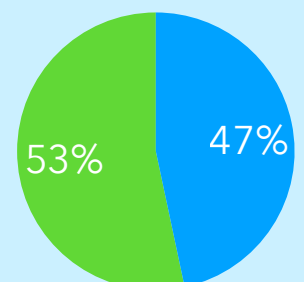
# Speechtherapy & signlanguage class



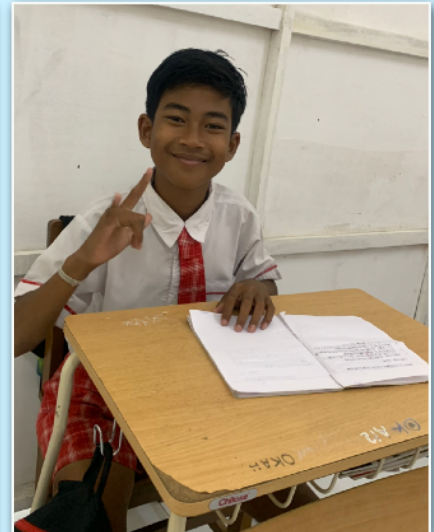

For the children living in Karangasem, Kolewa arranges daily transportation with our school bus, driven by Komang. This ensures that distance is never a barrier to education and that every child can reach school safely and consistently.

At the beginning of 2025, we welcomed one new child, Gede Surya, into our School Project Program. During the same period, Kurniawan, Neni, and Perdiawan made the difficult decision to stop their education in order to seek employment and support their daily living needs.

To ensure the continuity and impact of the program, we were grateful to include three additional children: Gita, Dwika, and Keysha. Gede Surya, Gita, and Dwika are currently enrolled at Sushrusa School and actively participate in weekend sign language and speech therapy sessions at Rumah Bicara. Due to financial constraints, their families are unable to fully cover the required school fees, making Kolewa's support essential.

Keysha, the youngest and most recent addition to the program, has just begun her educational journey and shows strong motivation and enthusiasm to participate in both speech therapy and sign language sessions.

In November 2025, the Kolewa team traveled to Kupang, Timor, for our annual Family Gathering. This special weekend event is organized to reconnect with former patients from Timor and the surrounding islands, to check on their wellbeing, and to bring children and parents together once again. It is also an important moment to share information on medical follow-up, nutrition, hygiene, and available support.

A total of 38 former patients attended the gathering, accompanied by their parents or guardians. The event was made even more meaningful by the presence of a delegation from Rotary Club Bali Nusa Dua, Dutch board member Koos van Alphen, and plastic surgeon Dr. Yulan. During the weekend, Dr. Yulan carefully examined all children to assess their progress and determine whether additional treatment or follow-up care in Bali would be needed.

The Family Gathering remains a powerful moment of connection, reassurance, and trust – strengthening the bond between families, medical professionals, partners, and the Kolewa team, and reminding everyone that care does not end after surgery.

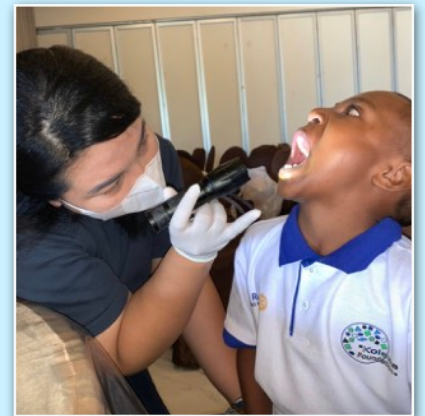

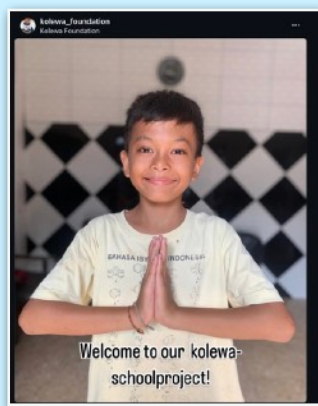

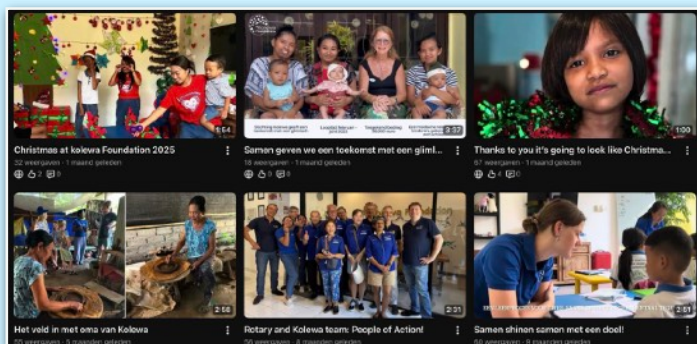

Our deaf and hard-of-hearing children were invited by Rotary Club Bali Nusa Dua to take part in a large and festive Christmas celebration. For many of them, it was an unforgettable experience: being seen, included and celebrated, surrounded by music, laughter and friendship in a setting where communication in sign language came naturally with the help of our team.

A very important milestone followed shortly after. In 2025, Yayasan Kolewa Harapan Indonesia received official recognition from the Indonesian Ministry of Social Affairs (Kementerian Sosial RI) as a Lembaga Kesejahteraan Sosial (LKS). This recognition confirms that our organisation demonstrably meets the legal standards as set out in Permensos No. 17/2012. It is a meaningful acknowledgement of the professionalism, transparency and care with which our team carries out its work every single day.

At Rumah Bicara, we closed the year with a warm and joyful Christmas celebration. Patients, parents, deaf children and team members came together to share food, stories and laughter. For a moment, medical appointments and worries faded into the background, making space for connection and comfort.



Thanks to a generous donation from our Dutch Kolewa friends Jan & Yvonne Soplanit, the team enjoyed a relaxed pizza evening on the very last day of the year – a simple but heartfelt way to end 2025 together.



As a final gesture of appreciation, the board expressed its gratitude to all staff members by awarding a year-end bonus, acknowledging their dedication, hard work and compassion throughout the year. These moments remind us that Kolewa is more than an organisation. It is a community – one that celebrates milestones, cares deeply for one another and closes each year with gratitude and hope for what lies ahead.





# Kolewa financial report

In 2025, Yayasan Kolewa Harapan Indonesia continued to receive consistent and essential support from our Dutch counterpart, Stichting Kolewa. These donations, transferred four times a year and generated through fundraising efforts in the Netherlands, remain a crucial pillar in sustaining our charitable programs. In December 2025, we received an advance contribution of IDR 480.000.000 to support the activities of the first semester of 2026.

In addition, Rotary Club Bali Nusa Dua once again made a generous contribution toward the accommodation and transportation costs of children receiving treatment for Cleft Lip and Palate (CLP). Their continued involvement plays an important role in ensuring that medical care remains accessible for families in need.

We were also grateful for the ongoing support from visitors, churches, and local entrepreneurs in Bali. Donations in the form of goods, food supplies, and practical assistance significantly complemented our resources and strengthened our ability to respond flexibly to daily needs throughout the year.

The year 2025 started with a solid financial position, with an opening balance of IDR 2,593,721,584, including an advance payment for the first quarter from Stichting Kolewa, our Dutch counterpart. During the year, Yayasan Kolewa Harapan Indonesia received a total of IDR 5,416,358,552 in income again including an in advance donation for the first semester 2026 from the Dutch foundation .

This amount consisted besides the continued support from our Dutch counterpart, generous contributions from visitors, and a significant grant from Rotary Club Bali Nusa Dua for our cleft lip and palate program.

Thanks to careful financial management we generated IDR 63,472,691 in interest income.

Throughout 2025, Yayasan Kolewa spent IDR 4,121,250,569 on our various programs and activities. These expenses closely matched our original budget estimate of IDR 4,135,281,025, reflecting responsible planning and spending

Maintaining a financial reserve is essential to ensure continuity of our work during unexpected crises. Past events such as the Mount Agung eruption and the COVID-19 pandemic showed how quickly income and fundraising can be affected, while the needs of children and families remain. In addition, our reserve helps prepare for future costs, such as extending our rental contract in 2030, a possible relocation, and replacing our school bus when needed. This financial buffer allows Kolewa to continue operating sustainably and responsibly.

Thanks to this careful financial stewardship, we enter 2026 in a strong position. This allows us not only to continue our current programs, but also to invest in new projects that will further support children, families, and communities in the years ahead.
